TYMERE PARKER OF PHILADELPHIA ARRESTED FOR THANKSGIVING DAY MURDER IN NORRISTOWN

NORRISTOWN, Pa. (Feb. 8, 2022) — Montgomery County District Attorney Kevin R. Steele, U.S. Marshal for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania Eric Gartner and Norristown Police Chief Derrick Wood announce the arrest of Tymere “Brady” Parker, 20, of Sanger Street in Philadelphia, for First-Degree Murder, Conspiracy and related charges in the killing of 25-year-old Edilberto Miguel Palaez Moctezuma on Thanksgiving Day in his Arch Street residence. Two other defendants have already been arrested related to the murder: Kevon Clarke was arrested on Dec. 13, 2021, and Savian Creary was arrested on Jan. 24, 2022.

At approximately 7:30 a.m. today, Parker was arrested by members of the U.S. Marshals Violent Crime Fugitive Task Force and the Montgomery County Detective Bureau at a female associate’s residence in the 4600 block on Longshore Avenue in northeast Philadelphia. Upon knocking and announcing, Parker attempted to flee out the rear of the residence. Deputy Marshals then made entry into the home and arrested Parker without further incident. At the time of his arrest, Park was in possession of a 9mm ghost gun.

Parker is the third and final defendant arrested for a murder happened on Thursday, Nov. 25, 2021. Norristown Police were dispatched at 9:28 p.m. to the 1100 block of Arch Street for a male shot. Police arrived to find Moctezuma unresponsive with a

gunshot wound to his torso. He was flown to Penn Presbyterian, where he was pronounced dead. The victim, who was not involved in the shooting in any way, was sitting at the table eating Thanksgiving dinner when a single shot came through the window and struck him.

A joint homicide investigation was launched by Montgomery County Detectives and Norristown Police. The investigation found that the shooting was connected to a dispute that happened at a Thanksgiving dinner party at the 100 block of Haws Avenue, where four individuals—Kevon Clarke, his girlfriend Jacqueline Brown and two others—were asked to leave following a dispute. Also involved in the dispute at the party was Creary, who is Brown's ex-boyfriend, and Parker.

The investigation found that Brown, Clarke and the two others returned to Clarke's residence on Basin Street. Following their departure, alcohol was discovered missing, and Brown was texted about the theft by her cousin, who had also been at the party. Arrangements were made to return the alcohol outside of Clarke's residence on Basin Street, turning it over to the cousin, J.S. The cousin initially told detectives that she double-parked her car outside the residence, saw Clarke exit the residence brandishing a gun and quickly drove off. She later admitted under oath that Creary and Parker were also in her car and that she dropped them off prior to the shooting on Dekalb Street close to Basin Street and then picked them up after the shooting. J.S. then drove the two defendants back to Creary's vehicle, a Dodge Charger. The investigation also found that a witness saw Creary's Dodge Charger driving on Basin Street after the shooting.

Detectives located seven .40 caliber fired cartridge cases, six 9 mm fired cartridge cases and one live round in the area of Basin and Arch Streets. The investigation determined through the use of two different surveillance videos and analysis of the bullet hole in the window that the shot fired into the Arch Street residence killing Pelaez Moctezuma came from Clarke's shooting location. Two other males, believed to be Creary and Parker, are seen in the surveillance video running from the shooting scene.

"The U.S. Marshals worked diligently in finding this defendant accused for his role in causing the death of an innocent man eating his Thanksgiving dinner. We are grateful for their help to our detectives in getting this defendant safely off the streets without further bloodshed," said DA Steele.

Parker is charged with First-Degree Murder, Third-Degree Murder and Conspiracy to Commit Murder. Parker will be arraigned today and a preliminary hearing will be set at that time. As there is no bail available for First-Degree Murder charges, Parker will be remanded to the Montgomery County Correctional Facility.
